The music for this Service has been chosen in honor of Independence Day. *Charles Ives 1874-1954*, was one of American’s most iconoclastic composers. The *Variations on America* was written when he was 17 years old. A graduate of Yale University, he was also an incredibly successful businessman, creating at the time, the country’s largest insurance agency. His compositions, largely unappreciated in his lifetime, have since become a hallmark in 20th century music. *William Billings 1746-1800*, was the country’s first recognized native born composer. He was a self taught musician who ran a singing school, published a number of musical works and was a friend of Samuel Adams and Paul Revere. *Randall Thompson 1899-1984*, was commissioned by Serge Koussevitzky to write an opening fanfare piece for the Berkshire Music Festival at Tanglewood, Massachusetts. Instead, moved by the war in Europe and the fall of France, Thompson wrote this haunting work which was premiered on July 8, 1940. *Virgil Thomson 1896-1992* was born in Kansas, educated at Harvard, and was the recipient of the Pulitzer Prize as well as 20 honorary doctorates! *Dudley Buck 1839-1909*, was educated at Trinity College, Hartford, Connecticut, and in addition studied in Leipzig, Germany and in Paris, France. He eventually settled in New York City, becoming one of its most notable musicians.

Help us, O Lord, to finish the good work here begun. Strengthen our efforts to blot out ignorance and prejudice, and to abolish poverty and crime. And hasten the day when all our people, with many voices in one united chorus, will glorify thy holy Name.
