Postlude "Now Thank We All Our God" Sigfrid Karg-Elert 1877-1933

*Music Notes: Sigfrid Karg-Elert 1877-1933* was a German composer of considerable fame in the early part of  
the 20<sup>th</sup> century, whose works include chamber and orchestral music, choral works, lieder, and pieces for  
piano and organ. *John Ireland (1879-1962)* was born in Bowdon, England. Bowdon has special significance  
for St. Peter's. Our parish hioner, Philip Barnes is from there, and the parish church – St. Mary the Virgin – was  
host to our choir in the summer of 2000. Sasha Johnson Manning, the Choir Director of that parish, has  
written a number of compositions for our choir! *G. P. da Palestrina 1525-1594* was organist and choirmaster  
for a number of churches in Rome, including St. Peter's, where he was director of music and composer for the  
Julian Chapel for most of his life. Considered one of the greatest composers of choral music, he composed  
over 100 masses and 300 motets, as well as madrigals, magnificats and other sacred music. Much of his music  
was published during his lifetime.
