Postlude “Carillon” Louis Vierne 1870-1937

Music Notes: Charles Tournemire 1870-1939 was the youngest student of César Franck, and became the Organist Titulaire at the Basilique Ste-Clotilde in Paris from 1898 to 1939. His *L'Orgue Mystique*, a group of 51 sets of five pieces each, was composed between 1927 and 1932 and covers the cycle of the Roman Catholic liturgical year, each set being based on the Gregorian chants for the day. *Ralph Vaughan Williams 1872-1958* was one of England's and the 20th century's most important composers. His setting of the *Benedictus Dominus Deus* is for a combined unison and four part choir. *George Thalben-Ball (1896-1987)* was the Organist and Choir Master of London's famed Temple Church. *Edward Elgar 1857-1934* was one of England's great composers. *Louis Vierne (1870-1937)* was a pupil of both Franck and Widor and was the Organist of Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris. The Postlude is based on the Westminster (Big Ben) clock chime.
