Postlude "Carillon de Westminster" Louis Vierne 1870-1937  
*(This piece is the final work on the new organ CD from St. Peter's.)*

*Music Notes:* Today is the last occasion on which we sing "Alleluias" until Easter Day. So, we have included lots of them! *Simon Preston (1938 -)* is one of England's most noted organists, conductors and composers. He formerly held posts as the Organist and Choir Master at Christ Church, Oxford and later Westminster Abbey. . *Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924)* was born in Dublin and was an honors graduate of Cambridge University. He became Professor of Music at both the Royal College of Music and Cambridge University. At the request of the king, *George Frideric Handel (1685-1759)* wrote four anthems for the coronation of George II on October 11, 1727 in Westminster Abbey. *Zadok the Priest* has been sung at every coronation since. *Louis Vierne (1870-1937)* was a pupil of both Franck and Widor and was the Organist of Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris. The Postlude is based on the Westminster (Big Ben) clock chime.
