*MUSIC NOTES:* John Stanley 1713-1786, the composer of today's organ works, was completely blinded by an accident in infancy, and yet went on in life to become one of the most eminent musicians of his generation in England. A friend of Handel's, he composed an opera, oratorios, cantatas, instrumental and keyboard works. Healey Willan 1880-1968 was born and educated in England. He came to Canada in 1913 and became Organist of St. Mary Magdalene Church in Toronto in 1921. He also taught at the Royal Conservatory of Music and the University of Toronto. Willan composed more than 300 works including two symphonies, chamber and choral music. We sing his setting of the communion service at Rite I services of Holy Eucharist here at St. Peter's. Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924) was born in Dublin and was an honors graduate of Cambridge University. He became Professor of Music at both the Royal College of Music and Cambridge University.
